Program Updates: Nutrients, Climate Change, Waukesha Diversion, Microplastics

As we head into winter in the Great Lakes - St. Lawrence Region, the Cities Initiative finds itself in the midst of working on many of its programs. Below are brief updates on several of our key program areas.

- Nutrient work continues to move forward as we work to build partnerships, particularly in Ontario and the U.S., with a focus on the western basin of Lake Erie.
- Our climate change work now encompasses both adaptation and mitigation strategies for municipalities in the Great Lakes region, and we are working with municipalities as well as with the Compact of Mayors to

- give municipalities the resources to both adapt to and mitigate the effects of global climate change. Cities are often the first to feel the effects of climate change and are at the forefront global climate action.
- Waukesha Diversion Application: The Cities Initiative continues to monitor the application and will provide comments at all stages of the process
- Microplastics and Marine Debris: Although the U.S. has banned plastic microbeads, the Cities Initiative continues to work on this issue in Canada and is working to increase its overall programming on reducing the amount of plastic pollution and other debris found in the Great Lakes and St. Lawrence.

Milwaukee recognizes "Green Luminaries"

The Milwaukee Metropolitan Sewerage District's "Green Luminaries" program highlights a different innovator in green infrastructure each month. The program has recognized private companies, schools, neighborhoods, and more, and draws attention to the value of collaborative efforts to sustain our water resources and communities.

IJC Releases Report on Great Lakes - St. Lawrence Progress

The International Joint Commission has released its review of recommendations from its February 2000 report on the Great Lakes - St. Lawrence Region. The review is largely positive and recognizes the region as a model for watersheds around the world. The report calls on the federal governments of both Canada and the United States to improve the accuracy of Great Lakes - St. Lawrence water level monitoring, to include climate resilience in future planning, to assess the impact of groundwater withdrawals, and to increase collaboration on infrastructure improvements in order to ensure adequate water resources for all people and ecosystems in the Great Lakes - St. Lawrence Region.
