

## Water Quality Objectives



- 1. Safe drinking water
- Unrestricted swimming and recreation
- 3. Unrestricted **fish and wildlife** consumption
- 4. Free of harmful pollution
- 5. Support habitats and species
- 6. Free from harmful algal blooms
- 7. No new or spreading **invasive** species
- 8. Uncontaminated groundwater
- 9. Free from other harmful conditions















Cities of Hamilton, Burlington, and Halton Region, Ontario

- Partnership between federal, provincial and municipal governments
- 2021- completed dredging and containment of contaminated sediments
- 2022 site can be developed for use as port lands
