Perkinsfield Park (43 County Road 6 South, Tiny)





What is the Community Garden?

Tiny's Community Garden in Perkinsfield Park creates a space to plant and care for vegetables, flowers and herbs. The Garden offers plots to rent, an eco-lawn, sensory gardens, a communal herb spiral, picnic tables, and a beautiful wildflower garden that surrounds the enclosure creating a space for pollinators to forage.


How does the Garden work?

Tiny's Community Garden is open from May 1st to October 31st. Members of the public can rent a plot using Tiny's Online Portal or by calling into the municipal office. The cost to rent a single garden plot (a raised 4ft x 8ft bed) is \$25 + HST. The rental fee includes a prepared garden bed, access to municipal water, a communal tool shed, a picnic area and access to the herb spiral.



Be Kind to Tiny Pollinators!

Pollinators are some of the hardest working creatures in nature! They are completely oblivious to their hard work while accidentally moving pollen from flower to flower foraging for food.



Without pollinators, more than 80% of Earth's plants would disappear and 75% of the food we enjoy would no longer exist. Foods many of us love like honey, apples, blueberries, and coffee would be gone. In Tiny, pollinators help our farmers produce alfalfa, soybeans, sunflowers, and canola.



A hive of bees must fly 80,000 km and visit two million flowers to make one small jar of honey.



Keep an eye out for pollinators in this garden! It can be easy to spot bees and butterflies, but there are others, like wasps, flies, moths, beetles, bats and hummingbirds!

Plant a Garden for Pollinators


