

# Great Lakes Coastal Cleanup: Volunteer Toolkit

Thank you for taking action to protect the Great Lakes! This quick guide will help you stay safe and informed during your shoreline cleanup.

## WHAT WILL BE SUPPLIED

- Water (to fill refillable bottles)
- Garbage bags/buckets
- Data sheets and pencils
- Reusable gloves (work or gardening gloves)
- Hand sanitizer
- Litter containers



## WHAT TO BRING











- Refillable water bottle (water stations will be available)
- Closed-toe shoes
- Hat, sunscreen, and weather-appropriate clothing

#### **SAFETY FIRST!**

- Watch your step! Be mindful of sharp objects, uneven ground, and slippery rocks.
- Don't touch hazardous items Leave needles, broken glass, or dead animals in place and notify a designated Coastal Cleanup lead.
- Please respect wildlife Don't disturb nests or animals. Keep your distance.
- Stay hydrated and take breaks Use sunscreen, drink water, and know your limits.
- Be aware of your surroundings Stay in the designated cleanup zone. Work in pairs or groups, if possible.
- If you don't feel safe, stop! Don't put yourself in a situation that will make you feel uncomfortable or put yourself in harm's way.

# WHAT TO PICK UP (AND WHAT NOT TO)



Collect: Plastic bottles, bags, caps, food wrappers, straws, cigarette butts, cans, foam, fishing line.























**Do NOT collect:** Hazardous waste (needles, chemicals), large/heavy items. sharp glass, animal carcasses. Notify your designated Coastal Cleanup lead.













# TRACKING YOUR IMPACT

- Please make sure to follow instructions from your site coordinator!
- You will record litter data in groups using paper data sheets. Please return those sheets to your site coordinator before leaving.
- The data collected from our Coastal Cleanup will be entered into a public data system managed by the Ocean Conservancy (TIDES-https://www.coastalcleanupdata.org/). Data will also be reported back to the Ontario Government as the project funder.

### **AFTER THE CLEANUP**

- Return all supplies provided by your cleanup crew and any data sheets.
- · Wash your hands or use sanitizer.
- Celebrate what you accomplished—you helped protect one of the world's largest freshwater ecosystems!

## WHY THE COASTAL CLEANUP MATTERS

- **Plastic is everywhere:** Over 10 million kg of plastic enter the Great Lakes each year. Most of it is single-use—bottles, wrappers, cigarette butts—that breaks down into microplastics which can impact the health of wildlife and humans!
- Wildlife is at risk: Fish, birds, and turtles can ingest or get tangled in litter.
- **We drink this water:** The Great Lakes supply drinking water to over 40 million Canadians and Americans let's keep this vital resource clean!
- Your contribution drives change: What you collect and record helps reduce waste in our lakes and rivers and provides data to support better decision-making. Every piece of litter you collect makes a big difference!

## **FAST FACTS ABOUT THE GREAT LAKES**
