First-Ever Great Lakes Coastal Cleanup Brings Together Over 415 People to Remove Litter Along Shorelines Across Ontario

Six Communities Across the Province Partnered on World Rivers Day for Shoreline Cleanups to Remove Over 1.5 Tons of Litter Along Each of Ontario's Great Lakes

St. Catharines, ON – October 2, 2025 – The Great Lakes and St. Lawrence Cities Initiative successfully completed its first-ever Great Lakes Coastal Cleanup this past weekend on World Rivers Day, September 28. Funded by the Government of Ontario through the Great Lakes Local Action Fund, and supported by Greenland Engineering and Presteve Foods, the event mobilized communities across Ontario to remove shoreline litter and raise awareness about protecting the Great Lakes and St. Lawrence River.

Across six Ontario communities – Chatham-Kent, Cobourg, Collingwood, Kingston, Owen Sound, and Thunder Bay – volunteers came together to collect litter from beaches, parks, and waterfront areas. **More than 415 volunteers came together across 11 sites** to help clean up these vital areas. Over 30 partners, including local environmental groups and community organizations, supported local efforts in the six participating communities.

Across all locations, **volunteers collected roughly 1,600 kg of litter** — equivalent to the weight of a pickup truck or a small sailboat! Common items collected included cigarette butts, food wrappers and packaging, plastic bags, and plastic fragments. These results highlight the ongoing challenge of litter pollution in the Great Lakes. Each year, an estimated 10 million kilograms of plastic enter the Great Lakes, a crucial source of drinking water for roughly 60% of people in Ontario.

The Great Lakes Coastal Cleanup marks the beginning of a growing movement across Ontario to take action at the community level to protect our fresh water. With measurable results in its inaugural year and strong engagement from residents, the Cities Initiative intends to expand the program in 2026 to include additional municipalities and cleanup sites.
